Background

The **European Pillar of Social Rights** (EPSR) was launched in November 2017 and sets out 20 key principles to create a strong social Europe that is fair, sustainable and inclusive for all. Some of these principles are particularly relevant for the employment of people with disabilities:

- Principle 1 on Education, training and life-long learning: everyone has the right to quality and inclusive education, training and life-long learning in order to maintain and acquire skills that enable them to participate fully in society and manage successfully transitions in the labour market.
- Principle 3 on Equal opportunities: regardless of gender, racial or ethnic origin, religion or belief, disability, age or sexual orientation, everyone has the right to equal treatment and opportunities regarding employment, social protection, education, and access to goods and services available to the public. Equal opportunities of under-represented groups shall be fostered.
- Principle 4 on Active support to employment: everyone has the right to timely and tailor-made assistance to improve employment or self-employment prospects. This includes the right to receive support for job search, training and re-qualification. Everyone has the right to transfer social protection and training entitlements during professional transitions.
- Principle 10 on Healthy, safe and well adapted work environments: workers have the right to a high level of protection of their health and safety at work. Workers have the right to a working environment adapted to their professional needs and which enables them to prolong their participation in the labour market. Workers have the right to have their personal data protected in the employment context.
- o **Principle 17 on Inclusion on people with disabilities:** people with disabilities have the right to income support that ensures living in dignity, services that enable them to participate in the labour market and in society, and a work environment adapted to their needs.

An **Action Plan** was developed by the Commission to provide concrete steps and actions that the EU and its Member States have to take in terms of policies and reforms to fully implement the EPSR. The Action Plan also sets three EU-level targets to be achieved by 2030 in the area of employment, skills and poverty reduction. In particular, the employment target aims to at least 78% of the population aged between 20 to 64 should be in employment by 2030.







Objectives of the meeting

To showcase the work EPR Members do that links to those principles, to learn from each other's good practices, to discuss the challenges and potential solutions in those fields, including the role of government, funders and the EU, EPR implements for the third year the EPR-EPSR Day.

Travel Practicalities

The most convenient way to reach Barcelona from a foreign country is by plane.

A) Travel to Barcelona BY PLANE

Barcelona Airport-El Prat has two passenger terminals:

- Terminal 1: It is the main terminal and is in charge of both domestic and international services of major airlines.
- Terminal 2: It handles low cost carriers flights.

There is a **free shuttle bus between both terminals** available. The bus runs 24 hours and varies its frequency according to the hour of the day. The travel time from Terminal 1 to Terminal 2 is about 10 minutes, whilst travel time from Terminal 2 to Terminal 1 is 14 minutes. More info <u>here</u>.







B) Transport from the airport to Barcelona city

At Barcelona Airport there are available the following means of transport to get to the city centre:

- **Bus:** There are public transport services available from Barcelona Airport. See the different bus options <u>here</u>.
- <u>Aerobus:</u> A bus route that gets directly from Barcelona city centre to BCN Airport. Aerobus tickets can be purchased online. a single ticket costs 5.90€.
- **Taxi:** Get within 30 minutes to Barcelona city centre. Taxi ranks are located in front of both terminals and vehicles are black and yellow. The journey costs around 30€.
- Metro: Metro L9 connects Barcelona Airport to downtown; it has stops at both terminals T1 and T2 every 7 minutes. Travel time to downtown takes 30 minutes. In order to reach Barcelona city center, passengers must transfer to L1, L5 or L3, depending on your final destination. Barcelona Metro runs daily from 05:00am and resumes at midnight. Saturday to Sunday nights it runs 24 hours. On Friday night, it resumes at 02:00am and starts at 05:00am. The single ticket is 4.60€.
- **C)** Transportation within the city: <u>Hola Barcelona Travel card</u> provides unlimited journeys on public transportation in Barcelona for 2 consecutive days. **Travel to airport is included.**
