



## BACKGROUND

- 1/3 SE Worldwide; ~ 15% Europe
- Total number keeps increasing
- Varying numbers across Europe: eg. The Netherlands (+3%) vs. Portugal (-30%)



## BACKGROUND

# Differences in social security

- 25/35 EU countries: obligated sickness insurance
  - Insurance rules vary across countries: benefits, waiting periods etc.
- 10/35 EU countries: optional insurance
  - ➤ Max. 20% opt for full insurance



#### BACKGROUND

- 2018: 18.1 million new cancer cases worldwide
- 25% in EU
- 20% before age 50; 70% before age 70
- 50% within working age
- Relative mortality rate decreases
- → RTW among SE should be an important focus

#### RESULTS

- Varying results across Europe:
  - Differences in social security
  - ➤ Heterogeneous group
- More often:
  - ➤ Male: 90% more
  - ➤ Older: most often 25 49, also more often 50 65
  - Employed in "high risk" sectors: industry, construction, agriculture



## RESULTS

- Trends among the SE:
  - Stay at work longer
  - > Take less time off work
  - More often reduced working hours
- → Prioritise their business instead of their health



# RESULTS

- General finding: financial worry
  - Lower income
  - > Less income in case of sickness absence
  - More often negative financial changes

# Preliminary findings:

- SE should be better protected financially
- Programs should also focus on working through treatment
- → More research that focusses on SE is needed!



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
